In this edition we step out from under this old Oak tree at Mont de Lancey and wander around the grounds of the 2024 Festival.

First we see one of the draught horses walking around in circles, harnessed to a contraption called The Horse Works, which in turn is attached via a long belt driving a water pump. Previously this pump would have pumped water from a water hole to the household.

The car park is full and in the foreground is a hay bailer which is being driven by a Lister stationary engine. The hay is fed into the rectangle box, compressed, and forced down the shute to be tied and stacked, ready to be used when feed is scarce.

This presented problems for the organizers with Saturday declared a Total Fire Ban Day so no outdoor Steam Engines running and as Sunday and Monday would be in excess of their safe working temperature of 32 degrees Celsius and wind gusts greater than 150Kph the sensible decision was made not to run the outdoor Steam Engines at all over the event. For the wellbeing of the horses, they would not attend the event either.



WE NOW MOVE BACK TO ISSUE 129 AUGUST 2008. Where in we find an article from Tom Dathan.

I wonder where it is now??

A long time client of mine, who lived in Gladysdale was putting his property on the market and was going to have a garage sale. I was asked if I knew anyone who might be interested in purchasing an old dragsaw. Of course I knew many people who would have been obliging, but no one more than myself. After negotiating an extremely cheap price, I proceeded home and quickly re-

turned with a tandem trailer, loaded and returned home. Finding some info on the internet I learnt it was an Oregon frame New Record



with a 1A- 2hp horizontal Rosebery engine (rebadged as New Record) circa 1923-30. (?) The overall condition was poor. The flywheels and piston were free running but the valves were seized. After removing the engine and dismantling everything, I found the bore was badly scored due to a loose gudgeon. I shelved the engine for a while and proceeded to work on the chassis. All the steel parts were removed, de-rusted, cleaned and painted mid Brunswick green. The axle and wheels got the same treatment. After many hours of scraping the dirt, grease and grime off the timber, it was sanded, filled, primed, undercoated and received about four coats of red enamel. I lost count of the hours, I was covered in rust, dust and paint. New pins, bolts and bushes were turned on the lathe. Getting back to the engine, it was delivered to Jim Bennett who rebored and sleeved the cylinder. New rings and valves were purchased and fitted. The engine had about four layers of old paint so it had to be totally stripped off. After all the parts were refitted and assembled the engine was painted. Finally the engine was refitted to the frame on new timber rails as the old ones were broken. The project was starting to take shape as all I had to do was fit the Maggy. This is a Wico EK, . The time had finally come to try and start the thing. With help from Stuart and Jim Bennett, some fine tuning etc., the engine burst into life on Sunday, 25 May, 2008. After hundreds of hours of hard work and patience, I now stand back and admire a beautiful piece of

machinery. I am looking forward to my first rally. All in all, the project probably only cost me about ½ K which included rebore and sleeve, paint, some bolts, a condenser, a spark plug, rings, decal and a couple of valves. I'd like to sincerely thank club members



who gave me advice or information. Thanks especially to Jim for all his help with the engine etc. (And for putting up with my pestering.) Tom Dathan PAGE 8 YVMPS NEWS
